Drop Off and Pick-Up Procedures

On time drop off and pick up is important to your child's success. In order to make drop off and pick up as efficient for you, your child and other families, please follow the below procedures.

<u>Drop Off Time:</u> ACA's suggested drop off time is 7:50am. Students can arrive as early as 7:30am daily for breakfast. Please drop off scholars on Bancroft Ave and make sure they walk on the sidewalk to enter our campus. Or, please turn in on 80th to drop off students on Atherton St. Be sure to follow all traffic laws during drop off.

Pick Up Time: ACA's pick up time M-Th is 3:15pm and on Fridays at 12:10pm. Please be sure to pick up your scholar on time. If a non-parent picks up your scholar, please communicate the name and contact information of the person with office staff (ask them to bring identification to the office) to indicate your permission. Be sure to follow all traffic laws during pick up.





Early Pick-Up Policies and Procedures: Scholars are expected to attend school daily and should only be picked up early in the event of an emergency or for pre-scheduled appointments. Please contact the main office to communicate if your child needs to be picked-up early.

For the safety of students, parents or guardians are not to drop students off, nor are students to arrive at school, prior to 30 minutes before the start of school, unless the student is involved in a regular school activity, meeting, or community program. Similarly, it is the responsibility of the parents or guardians to arrange to have their student leave or be picked up right after school, unless the student is involved in a regular school activity, meeting, or community program or is staying at the request of school personnel. In case of emergency, all students should go directly to the school office at any time before or after school.

Students who cannot comply with these requirements are placing all those at the school at risk by disregarding safety considerations. Students placing themselves or others at risk by violating the above policies may be subject to disciplinary action, including suspension and expulsion.

School Site Attendance and Tardy Procedures

Regular, on-time attendance is important for your child's success. In the event your child is absent or tardy, please follow the procedures below:



- If your child is absent, please call the school office to report the absence within 5 days and ask for makeup work so that your child does not fall behind.
- If your child is tardy, please have them come to the office to sign in for the day and obtain a "tardy pass" before they go to class.
- If your child is absent due to illness for 3 or more days, in order to excuse the
 absence, your child will need a doctor's note for verification. Parents or
 Guardians can send doctor's notes to the office via email, fax, scan, and picture
 text through Parentsquare Messenger.
- Your child will be considered tardy if he/she arrives after 8:00am.

School Site Specific Dress Code

1. Introduction

Learning deserves an environment of respect and freedom from distraction. Aspire Board Policy requires that all students enrolled in Aspire Public Schools comply with the school's uniform policy. Students who are out of uniform will be subject to disciplinary action. The uniform reflects a positive pride in self and school. Decisions regarding dress and grooming are campus decisions, and the decision of the principal is considered final.

The purpose of uniform dress at school is:

- To focus students on school as a professional workplace.
- To focus students away from clothing as a competition.
- To symbolize our united effort on the road to college.
- To develop and enhance a sense of school pride.
- To enhance school safety.

2. ACA Uniform

All components of the uniform must be labeled with the student's name.

Uniforms (to include shoes) must be clean, maintained, appropriately sized, and worn as designed.

The ACA uniform includes:

- Black skirts and/or trousers (not jean or stretch material),
- Purple, white polo or gray shirts with or without the Aspire logo,
- A pair closed toed shoes.
- Recommended: One purple sweater and/or sweatshirt, plain or with the Aspire logo.
- Recommended: One heavy jacket or coat of any color suitable for typical school activities.

3. Uniform Schedule

4. Clothing

- Male and female students must wear sufficient undergarments.
- Student shoulders must be covered by their shirts. No shoulder straps less than three
 inches wide (e.g. spaghetti straps), bare midriffs, halter tops, or bare back tops are
 prohibited. Tops must sufficiently cover a student's cleavage.
- Dresses and skirts must be a minimum of knee length. Mini or micro skirts or dresses are prohibited.
- Tight fitting shorts, "short shorts," and "daisy dukes" are prohibited.
- "Sagging" (e.g. wearing bottoms below hips and/or buttocks) and extremely baggy clothing is prohibited. **Undergarments may not be showing at any time.**
- Torn, ripped, and/or cut clothing unless patched or repaired is prohibited.
- Cutoffs, boxer shorts, pajama bottoms, biker shorts, short leggings as outer garments, etc. are prohibited.
- Heels, shoes with wheels, sandals, CROCS etc. are prohibited.
- Any article of clothing that references or promotes offensive (e.g. racist, sexist, religious intolerant, etc.) slogans, symbols, and/or designs is prohibited.
- Any article of clothing that references or promotes sex or sexually explicit material is prohibited.
- Any article of clothing that references or promotes drugs, alcohol, or tobacco is prohibited.
- Any article of clothing that references or promotes gangs or violence is prohibited.

5. **Accessories**

- Hats are permitted outside only; however, they are prohibited for wear inside buildings except for religious or medical purposes. Hoodies are only permitted to be worn on a child's head outside ONLY. Bandanas, "do-rags," and headbands are prohibited.
- Other seasonal accessories are permitted (i.e. earmuffs, gloves, and rainboots)
- Earrings are the only piercings permitted for male or female students; however, gauges and/or spacers worn in ears are prohibited. Excessive piercing of the ear lobe or ear piercing other than the lobe is prohibited. Nose rings, tongue rings, lip rings, and any other forms of piercings are prohibited.
- "Grills" or decorations on teeth are prohibited; however, metallic crowns are always permitted for medical or dental purposes.



- jewelry or inappropriate accessories are prohibited; however, any medically necessary jewelry or accessory is always permitted.
- Any accessory that becomes a safety issue or causes a distraction is prohibited.

6. **Grooming**

- Hair should be clean and well-groomed.
- Cosmetic makeup (e.g. eye liner, eye shadow, lip stick, blush, etc.) is prohibited; however, lip balm or gloss is permitted.
- Acrylic and other designer nails are prohibited; however, manicures are permitted.
- Eyebrow designs are prohibited.
- appropriate tattoos, brands, and other forms of body art are prohibited.

7. <u>Disciplinary Action</u>

- ACA can require that a student change into more appropriate attire, or if possible, remove clothing or accessories in violation of the dress code.
- ACA can require that a student change grooming habits in violation of the dress code.
- ACA can inform the parent(s) or guardian(s) to inform them of dress code policy violations via phone, email, and/or letter.
- ACA can request the parent(s) or guardian(s) to come to the school to address their student's dress code violation.
- ACA can suspend or expel a student for dress code violations that are habitually excessive and/or promote drugs, alcohol, violence, or gang affiliations.
- ACA reserves the right to update and enforce the dress code policy as needed at anytime.

Who gives Jag Points?

Everyone. Every staff member can and should give Jag points. Jag points are given on ClassDojo and displayed in the University Hall and in classrooms.

Why do we give Jag points?

Jag points are given when an entire class completes a request as a class community. For example:

- o Lining up at Voice Level 0
- o Walking in a college line
- o Transitioning quickly
- o Cleaning up
- o Responding to silent signal or attention getter
